VOLUNTEERING

2010 — current, member of the Puget Sound Bonsai Association, current serving on the board. This club works to promote and educate the public on the art of bonsai and how they can get involved. We have several shows each year as well as an auction and our regular monthly club meetings.

2006 – 2012, founding member of FIAT, Faith in Action Team. Worked with a small group of friends who decided we wanted to do more to give back to the community and felt we could accomplish more as a group. Together we discussed possible ways to get involved and talked with other organizations that might need the assistance of a small team. Once a direction was chosen we organized and implemented a plan to assist Baby Boutique (a Family Services program) soliciting donations, helping to sort the donations and get them out on the shop floor, with a major push to re-organize their storage room to fit more donations and operate more efficiently. Since then we have shifted our focus to neighborhood food drives to support Food Lifeline along with working with a coordinator from Catholic Community Services helping individuals in need.

1998 – 2006, Syndicate member involved in the restoration of the R-Boat Pirate and later donation of the restored vessel to the Center for Wooden Boats. The Pirate was originally built on Lake Union in 1927 and designed by the locally known boat designer Ted Geary. I had various roles over the course of the project including as a helper in the restoration itself, volunteering with the kids at Seattle school AS-1 on the Little Pirates program, and developing the graphic displays for a retrospective show on the Pirate's original designer Ted Geary that was displayed in 2005. Currently I occasionally assist as crew for her public sails on Lake Union.

In my early days in Seattle, I volunteered in a program called Architects and Children. The program was designed to utilize architecture (and architects) to put common educational coursework to use. Projects and topics included designing a mouse house, measuring skills, and outdoor investigations exploring how architecture is everywhere. The program is no longer active in the US.
